<p align="center">IDAHO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT</p> <p>This proposed constitutional amendment provides that only Idaho residents who are citizens of the United States are eligible to vote in elections in the State of Idaho and that noncitizens are not eligible to vote in any election in the State of Idaho. Currently, Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides: "every male or female citizen of the United States, eighteen years old, who has resided in this state, and in the county where he or she offers to vote for the period provided by law, if registered as provided by law, is a qualified elector." This provision does not expressly prohibit noncitizens from voting. The proposed amendment adds language to provide that only United States citizens may vote in elections in the State of Idaho.</p> <p>Question: Shall Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to provide that individuals who are not citizens of the United States may not be qualified electors in any election held within the state of Idaho?</p> <p>A YES vote would approve the proposed Constitutional Amendment for additional language providing that only United States citizens may vote in elections in the State of Idaho.</p> <p>A NO vote would make no change to the Idaho Constitution.</p> <p><input type="radio"/> YES</p> <p><input type="radio"/> NO</p>	<p align="center">SPECIAL REVENUE BOND ELECTION, CITY OF TROY, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO</p> <p>SHALL THE CITY OF TROY, IDAHO, BE AUTHORIZED TO INCUR AN INDEBTEDNESS AND TO ISSUE AND SELL ITS REVENUE BONDS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$4,400,000 TO PAY THE COST OF CONSTRUCTING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY, SAID BONDS TO BE PAYABLE SOLELY FROM SEWER SYSTEM REVENUES, OVER A TERM WHICH MAY BE LESS THAN BUT WHICH SHALL NOT EXCEED FORTY (40) YEARS, AS MORE FULLY PROVIDED IN ORDINANCE NO. 2024-03?</p> <p>The purpose for which the proceeds of the bonds will be used is for improvements to the sewer system, to include the replacement of a failed treatment component. The City currently has outstanding long-term indebtedness of \$1,577,555 paid solely from water system revenues. Since the bond will be paid solely from sewer system revenues, there will be no tax authorized on any taxable assessed value.</p> <p>The interest rate anticipated on the proposed bonds is 1.75%. The total principal amount to be repaid over the life of the bonds is \$4,400,000; the total interest estimated to be paid over the life of the bonds is \$1,268,436; the total amount estimated to be repaid over the life of the bonds is \$5,668,436. <p align="center">PROPOSITION 1</p> <p>Measure to:</p> <p>(1) replace voter selection of party nominees with a top-four primary;</p> <p>(2) require a ranked-choice voting system for general elections.</p> <p>This measure proposes two distinct changes to elections for most public offices.</p> <p>First, this measure would abolish Idaho's party primaries. Under current law, political parties nominate candidates through primary elections in which party members vote for a candidate to represent the party in the general election. The initiative creates a system where all candidates participate in a top-four primary and voters may vote on all candidates. The top four vote-earners for each office would advance to the general election. Candidates could list any affiliation on the ballot, but would not represent political parties, and need not be associated with the party they name.</p> <p>Second, the measure would require a ranked-choice voting system for the general election. Under current law, voters may select one candidate for each office, and the candidate with the most votes wins. Under the ranked-choice voting system, voters rank candidates on the ballot in order of preference, but need not rank every candidate. The votes are counted in successive rounds, and the candidate receiving the fewest votes in each round is eliminated. A vote for an eliminated candidate will transfer to the voter's next-highest-ranked active candidate. The candidate with the most votes in the final round wins.</p> <p>Funding Source Statement: The Idaho Open Primaries Act will be funded by an augmentation of existing state and county expenditures for advertising and tabulation. Implementation of the act will require 1.) A public awareness effort to inform voters, candidates, and election workers about changes to the election process, and 2.) The purchase of ballot tabulation equipment capable of conducting instant runoff elections.</p> <p>Fiscal Impact Statement: Under this initiative, new software for tabulating ballots via instant runoff voting is needed; no federally certified software exists for this process, though there is open-source software for tabulation. We cannot estimate the cost of software for tabulation.</p> <p>Seventeen counties need to purchase an election management software at an estimated cost of \$300,000. Material costs for a May primary election have been above \$800,000. By 2026, the (inflated, population) adjusted value is \$1,600,000. As a new councilman I had a lot to learn. Instantaneously I began studying policies, procedures, ordinances, and state statutes in an effort to do my very best. While educating myself I was given information by one of the city's staff regarding irregular procedures that affected how tax payer funds were being used. Out of concern I contacted the Secretary of State, AIC in Boise, the city attorney, and the county's prosecuting attorney to get guidance on what steps I should take given the information I acquired. I asked the mayor in public meetings and in a letter for transparency regarding these questionable issues but was refused information about why Juliaetta was acting outside of its own guidelines. I pressed for more transparency which unfortunately has led to my recall. I have always performed within the law and never misused my position as a councilman. My being a new voice in town who is incorruptible makes for an uncomfortable existence for the current mayor. I say with great concernment that the "Good 'Ole Boy's" still exist. Help me help you by voting that I remain on city council. KENDRICK JOINT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 283, LATAH, NEZ PERCE AND CLEARWATER COUNTIES, STATE OF IDAHO

The purposes for which the proposed levy revenues will be used and the approximate amount of levy funds to be allocated to each use are as follows:

Shall the Board of Trustees of School District No. 283, LATAH, NEZ PERCE AND CLEARWATER Counties, State of Idaho, be authorized and empowered to levy a Supplemental Levy in the amount of **Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand dollars (\$750,000)** per year for **One (1)** years, commencing with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026, for the purpose of financing any lawful expenses of maintaining and operating the District; all as provided in the Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on August 19, 2024.

The estimated average annual cost to the taxpayer on the proposed levy is a tax of \$314.84 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value, per year, based on current conditions. The proposed levy replaces an existing levy that will expire on **June 30, 2025**, and that currently costs \$327.94 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value. If the proposed levy is approved, the tax per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value is expected to **decrease the tax by \$13.10 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value.**

The expiration date of the District's current levy is **June 30, 2025.**
