IDAHO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT	SPECIAL REVENUE BOND ELECTION, CITY OF TROY, LATAH	
This proposed constitutional amendment provides that only Idaho residents who are citizens of the United States are eligible to vote in elections in the State of Idaho and that noncitizens are not eligible to vote in any election in the State of Idaho. Currently, Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides: "every male or female citizen of the United States, eighteen years old, who has resided in this state, and in the county where he or she offers to vote for the period provided by law, if registered as provided by law, is a qualified elector." This provision does not expressly prohibit noncitizens from voting. The proposed amendment adds language to provide that only United States citizens may vote in elections in the State of Idaho. YES         NO         PROPOSITION 1	The purpose for which the proceeds of the bonds will be used is for improvements to the sewer system, to include the replacement of a failed treatment component. The City currently has outstanding long-term indebtedness of \$1,577,555 paid solely from water system revenues. Since the bond will be paid solely from sewer system revenues, there will be no tax authorized on any taxable assessed value. The interest rate anticipated on the proposed bonds is 1.75%. The total principal amount to be repaid over the life of the bonds is \$4,400,000; the total interest estimated to be paid over the life of the bonds is \$1,268,436; the total amount estimated to be repaid over the life of the bonds is \$5,668,436. This measure proposes two distinct changes to elections for most public offices.	RECALL ELECTION	
First, this measure would abolish Idaho's party primaries. Under current aw, political parties nominate candidates through primary elections in which party members vote for a candidate to represent the party in the general election. The initiative creates a system where all candidates participate in a top-four primary and voters may vote on all candidates. The op four vote-earners for each office would advance to the general election. Candidates could list any affiliation on the ballot, but would not represent political parties, and need not be associated with the party they name. Second, the measure would require a ranked-choice voting system for the general election. Under current law, voters may select one candidate for each office, and the candidate with the most votes wins. Under the anked-choice voting system, voters rank candidates on the ballot in order	Argument FOR: This recall has been started because numerous Juliaetta citizens are very dissatisfied with the actions of councilmember Fuller regarding her inflammatory accusations at city council meetings and her lack of judgement on social media postings during a citywide crisis. ## KENDRICK JOINT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 283, LATAH, NEZ PERCE AND CLEARWATER COUNTIES, STATE OF IDAHO

The purposes for which the proposed levy revenues will be used and the approximate amount of levy funds to be allocated to each use are as follows:

Shall the Board of Trustees of School District No. 283, LATAH, NEZ PERCE AND CLEARWATER Counties, State of Idaho, be authorized and empowered to levy a Supplemental Levy in the amount of **Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand dollars (\$750,000)** per year for **One (1)** years, commencing with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026, for the purpose of financing any lawful expenses of maintaining and operating the District; all as provided in the Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on August 19, 2024.

The estimated average annual cost to the taxpayer on the proposed levy is a tax of \$314.84 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value, per year, based on current conditions. The proposed levy replaces an existing levy that will expire on **June 30, 2025**, and that currently costs \$327.94 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value. If the proposed levy is approved, the tax per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value is expected to **decrease the tax by \$13.10 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value.**
